
Deer Stalking Enquires



The Estates in the North Ross DMG welcome visitors to enjoy the fine opportunities for walking in this beautiful part of Scotland. The Group covers the area between Bonar Bridge and Garve running west to Ullapool and Ledmore. The Group area is bounded to the south and west by the A835, to the north by the A837 and to the east by the B9176 as indicated on the map.

There is a large population of wild deer within this area and, because they roam freely across estate boundaries, the estates co-operate through the Deer Management Group. The deer provide income to the estates, which, in turn, support many of those living and working in the glens.

Careful deer management is essential to ensure the long term viability and health of the wild population and also has important implications for the local economy; agriculture and forestry; and the habitats upon which the deer and other wild animals depend.

The vital part of deer management lies in the culling which, for stags, takes place during August to 20th October and, for hinds, from 21st October to 15th February, but mainly in November and December. (There is no stalking on Sundays). Walkers can help to avoid disturbing deer during these periods by keeping to established tracks.

Deer have a strong sense of smell and will be disturbed if human scent is carried to them. Depending on the strength and direction of the wind, they can detect presence of people from as much as a mile away. They are also very long sighted.
